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PHRASAL VERBS



What are *PHRASAL VERBS*?

• Phrasal verbs are phrases that indicate actions. They are generally used in spoken English and informal texts. Examples of such verbs include: *stand up, sit down, wake up* and *pick up*.

Phrasal verbs consist of a verb and a preposition or an adverb:

VERB	PREPOSITION / ADVERB
write	down
run	after
cut	out
come	in

Sometimes phrasal verbs consist of three elements:

VERB	PREPOSITION / ADVERB 1	PREPOSITION / ADVERB 2
run	out	of
look	forward	to
put	up	with
break	out	of

PHRASAL VERBS CLASIFICACTION

- Phrasal verbs are classified in two big groups:
- TRANSITIVE and INTRANSITIVE PHRASAL VERBS.
- TRANSITIVE PHRASAL VERBS are the ones that need an object to receive the action of the subject.
- Example:
- Turn on the TV / OR / Turn the TV on.
- Drink up your tea. / OR / Drink your tea up.
- Put on your coat . / OR / Put your coat on.
- INTRANSITIVE PHRASAL VERBS don't take an object. Example:
- Sit down.
- Stand up.
- Come in.
- Wake up

Phrasal verbs don't have the meaning of the two or three words they are made up, except for some cases; that is why it is important to recognize them in a text or in context and learn how to use them to increase our comprehension and understanding of the language.
